# Serve Home, Local Community Service Project For Adult Services

Several of Cushing’s adult participants had the opportunity to give back to the Community this Summer, working hand in hand with a local organization called “Serve Home.” Serve Home is a local, faith-based non-profit, that brings together people looking to help, with neighbors who need help. They accept helpers of all faiths, ages and abilities – and were thrilled to put Susan Giusti, Bob MacKinnon, and a rotating group of Cushing adults to work.

Their assigned project was to help a Holbrook woman whose husband had recently died, and whose home was in disrepair. Working with a team of 15-20 volunteers, ranging in age from 5 to senior citizens, the group spent one week demolishing a rotting deck, painting the

inside and outside of the home, removing a large pile of bricks, and performing several landscaping tasks.

“This was a great opportunity to see what our individuals were capable of, because we don’t have opportunities to perform duties like this very often,” noted Giusti. “The homeowner was so grateful, and brought out watermelon as treats for the workers.”
